

Beginners: Lesson 2

Bidding your Hand - Opener:

- The Dealer has first Bid
- Holding **12+ HCP** player will Open a **Suit** or **NT**
- A suit bid will show 5 cards in the majors, ♠ or ♥; 4 ♦'s or 2 ♣'s (we will play a short ♣ opening)
- With 15 -17 HCP and a balanced hand bid **1NT** (*a lot more details about this bid later*)
- **Without** 12+ HCP player will Pass (/)

Exercise: You are the Dealer, what will your bid be:

An Overcall:

- After an Opening Bid, the next player may make an **Overcall**, showing their partner they hold **12+ HCP** and **always** a **5 card suit**.
- Remember the bidding order, ♣, ♦, ♥, ♠, **NT**. This may cause the Overcaller some problems. *More details will be discussed in later lessons*
- An example of bidding showing an Overcall could look like (*N is Dealer*):

N	E	S	W
1♦	1♠	/	2♠
/	/	/	

Shows: **N: Opener** - holding 12+ HCP and 4 ♦'s

E: Overcalls holding 12+ HCP and 5 ♠'s

S: has < 6 HCP

W: holds 6+ HCP and 3 ♠'s for a fit in ♠

All players Pass and the contract is **2♠** for E to play.

The lead will come from **S** and their top ♦ would be good to honour partners bid.

- This bid would not be legal:

N	E	S	W
1♥	1♣		

Shows: **N: Opener** - holding 12+ HCP and 5 ♥'s

E: illegal Overcall - E is trying to say 12+ HCP and 5 ♣'s but has not followed the bidding order, better to Pass at this stage; learn more details later.

Partner's Response to Opening Bid:

- Partner opened a major. **Responder will bid to describe their hand.**
- With a **fit** Responder may now count distribution points.
- Add 5 for a Void, 3 for singleton or 1 for doubleton in any other suit to the HCP count.
- With 6+ points and a fit, bid 2 of the suit.

- If Opener bid a minor they may hold 4 of a major and want to know if you have 4!
- **Always** answer your major 4 suit before any minors (you may be outbid by an Overcall, if so consider a fit in partner's minor bid!).
- The Suits are bid in order ♣, ♦, ♥, ♠, **NT**; A Contract in major suits is worth more points.

Exercise: You must Respond to partners opening 1♥, what will your bid be:

Exercise: You Open 1♦, Partner responds 1♠, what is your next bid. You MUST answer Responder's bid (they may have a very strong hand!):

| ♣ K 5 | ♣ 8 4 3 | ♣ A K 6 4 3 | ♣ K T 8 |

Playing in a Suit:

- When a contract is in a suit, it is called **trumps**. Eg contract 2♥; ♥ are trumps
- It is best to eliminate the opposition's holding in trumps first, then all your winners in the other suits are safe.
- If you are holding 8 trumps the opposition have 5 - usually in 3/2 holding so you need to play 3 rounds of tricks to draw out trumps or;
- you have 9 trumps - opposition usually holds 2/2, you need to play 2 rounds of tricks
- If you are playing the contract always **Thank Dummy** for their cards when they are placed on the table after the first lead – *even if you are not really impressed with them!*

- * With no 5 card major E opens 1♦.
- * W bid 1♥, this gives the chance for partner to bid 1♠ if possible.
- * But E only has 3 ♠'s so 1NT is the answer.
